CHIPS

Where we come from, they're called Chips, not French Fries. Not to be confused with Potato Chips, which we call Crisps. Our Chips are freshly hand-cut Russet potatoes that are fried to a golden brown perfection.

CHIPS

Fresh cut and golden-fried Russet potatoes \$3.33

CURRIED CHIPS

Chips with a homemade chip shop curry sauce \$4.33

DUBLIN POUTINE

Chips topped with cheese curds and a Guinness brown gravy \$6.33

IRISH NACHOS

Chips topped with melted cheddar cheese, Applewood-smoked bacon, jalapenos, tomatoes, and scallions, drizzled with ranch crème fraiche \$9.33

SOFT PRETZELS

Baked salted soft pretzels, served with beer cheese \$8.33

PUB WINGS

Crispy chicken wings tossed in a Paddy Old Irish Whiskey sauce, served with bleu cheese dressing \$9.33

BUFFALO STYLE WINGS

Crispy chicken wings tossed in a buffalo sauce, served with bleu cheese dressing \$9.33

BANGERS AND CHIPS

Grilled Irish sausages, chips, and caramelized onions, topped with a homemade brown gravy, \$10.33

COTTAGE PIE

Minced beef, peas, carrots, and onions in a homemade gravy, topped with mashed potatoes \$13.33

FISH AND CHIPS

Golden brown beer-battered cod filets, served with chips and our own tartar sauce \$14.33

Who was Grace O'Malley?

Grace O'Malley (Irish: Gráinne Ní Mháille) was Queen of Umaille, chieftain of the Ó Máille clan, rebel, seafarer, and a fearless leader of Ireland. Grace's extraordinary life began in 1530, born to the seafaring O'Malley clan that controlled the southwest of County Mayo from their castle on Clare Island.

Proud and feisty from the get-go, Grace cut off all her hair and dressed in boys' clothes to sneak aboard her father's ship and prove to her parents that she could live a sailor's life. Her family then nicknamed her Gráinne Mhaol, which meant Gráinne the Bald. This was later shortened and anglicized to Granuaile, the Irish name by which this notorious legend is best known today.

Ambitious and fiercely independent, Grace excelled in the traditional seafaring trade of her family, with some piracy and plundering on the side. When the English captured her son and brother in 1593, Grace boldly set sail for England to confront Queen Elizabeth I herself. Upon meeting the Queen, Grace defiantly refused to bow, and somehow our daring Irish rebel convinced the bemused Queen to free her family and restore her lands.

By the time of her death at the age of 70, Grace was widely known for her sea adventures and fierce leadership, well earning her the titles of Pirate Queen and Sea Queen of Connacht. We are proud to open our doors in honor of the legendary Granuaile.
